Kelly V. Brinkley, *Chief Operating Officer of United Way of the National Capital Area*

Kelly V. Brinkley is the Chief Operating Officer (COO) of United Way of the National Capital Area. In this role, Kelly is responsible for providing leadership and overall management direction concerning a wide range of organizational activities including strategic planning, activities supporting effective business operations and departmental collaboration initiatives.

Before coming to United Way NCA, Kelly served as the COO for the Washington, D.C. Office of the State Superintendent of Education. As COO, she was responsible for student transportation, procurement, human resources and operations. She managed over 1,800 employees and a budget of \$100 million.

Prior to her position in D.C. government, she served on the transition team for the Bank of America/Merrill Lynch merger, where she was responsible for integrating their market risk programs, and as a Credit Risk Manager in Capital Markets Structured Finance where she focused on mortgage finance and derivatives. Her mortgage finance experience also includes positions at Fannie Mae and the National Community Reinvestment Coalition. In addition, she practiced corporate law at Saul Ewing, LLP.

Kelly has held several political positions including serving as the Federal Affairs Director for the City of Atlanta under the leadership of Mayor Bill Campbell. During her tenure, she created and implemented a federal affairs program in anticipation of the 1996 Olympic Games. She also served as a Legislative Assistant for Congressman John Lewis of Atlanta and for the Committee on the District of Columbia in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Kelly is a Woodrow Wilson Fellow and was an Ebony Magazine Young Leader of the Future. She received her B.A. in Economics from Spelman College and a Master's of Public Management degree from the University of Maryland, where she concentrated in Public Sector Financial Management. She received her law degree from the American University, Washington College of Law.

Miyesha Perry Chappell is the Manager of Grants & Administration at the Morris and Gwendolyn Cafritz Foundation, which funds nonprofit organizations in the metropolitan Washington area. Since 2002, Miyesha has served in both programmatic and operations positions at the Foundation, including program officer. As a program officer, her portfolio focused on groups working in the field of health (including primary care, mental health, and substance abuse), those serving prisoners, returning citizens and their families and those working to prevent and combat domestic violence and homelessness.

Most recently, she led the revision of the Washington Regional Association of Grantmakers' Common Grant Application (CGA) and was a Fellow in the second class of the Nonprofit Roundtable of Greater Washington's Future Executive Director Fellowship. In addition, Miyesha serves as Chair of the Grants Managers Network (GMN-DC) Chapter and as a Board Member of the Black Philanthropic Alliance (BPA). Miyesha received her M.B.A. and B.A. from Trinity College. She is a second-generation Washingtonian and a proud graduate of Calvin Coolidge High School.

Stephen A. Glaude, *Director of Community Affairs for District of Columbia Mayor Vincent C. Gray*

Stephen Glaude is currently Director of Community Affairs for District of Columbia Mayor Vincent C. Gray. In that capacity he manages 13 agencies for the Mayor which include the Offices of Latino Affairs, Asian Affairs, African Affairs, Religious Affairs, Veterans Affairs, Women's Policy, Youth Advisory Council, Grants and Partnerships and others. Prior to that he served as Director of Constituent Services for then DC Council Chairman Vincent Gray. Stephen also served as Director of Outreach for the Gray For Mayor Campaign. Mr. Glaude has held numerous leadership positions in government and the non-profit sector.

In government Stephen served as Deputy Undersecretary for Intergovernmental Relations with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development where was HUD's liaison to the Nation's Mayors and Governors in the country, and Special Assistant to the President in the Office of National Drug Control Policy at the White House.

In the non-profit sector Mr. Glaude has served as President of the National Association of Neighborhoods, President of the National Congress for Community Economic Development and Executive Director of Men Can Stop Rape.

Stephen has managed over 8 billion dollars in Federal grants programs and as a non-profit fundraiser has directly raised over 50 million and has strategically aligned clients to raise over 200 million in resources. At the White House, Stephen advised the President on demand-reduction strategies for substance abuse problems plaguing the Nation.

His political and campaign experience ranges from Presidential campaigns to state and local campaigns for Council Chairman and Mayor of the District of Columbia. Most recently Stephen served as Director of Outreach for the successful Gray for Mayor Campaign. Stephen has also served on Presidential, Council and Mayoral Transition Teams.

Stephen has received highest honor recognition within academia, government and the community sectors.

Stephen is a native Washingtonian, a father of 3 children and a proud graduate of Morgan State University.

Purvee Parekh Kempf, *Deputy General Counsel and Chief Policy Advisor, DC Benefits Health Exchange*

From 2003 to 2013, Ms. Kempf served as senior counsel for health policy in the US House of Representatives Committee on Energy and Commerce. Her primary responsibilities were protecting and improving federal regulation of private health insurance, Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program, health information technology, and privacy through legislation and oversight for Congressman Henry Waxman (D-CA) and previously Congressman John Dingell (D-MI). In that role she helped negotiate and draft the health reform provisions in the Affordable Care Act including the statutory authority and responsibilities for health benefit exchanges.

Ms. Kempf also negotiated and ushered through the House of Representatives groundbreaking health information technology and privacy legislation, as well as the expansion and reauthorization of the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act and the Children's Health Insurance Program. Prior to her work on Capitol Hill, Ms. Kempf was an associate in the health practice group at Hogan & Hartson, LLP, currently Hogan Lovells, and a healthcare consultant at Anderson Consulting, currently Accenture. She received an undergraduate degree from the University of California at Berkeley and a law degree from the University of Michigan Law School. She lives in the District with her husband and three young children.
